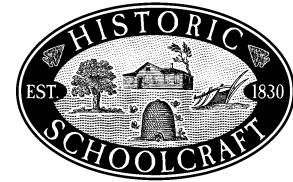

The DDA is in the process of evaluating and prioritizing their projects for the next few years. The DDA is interested in revitalization of the business district, and will be interviewing marketing firms to assist in business development, marketing, and a spending dollars locally campaign.

## Schoolcraft Police Department

### HALLOWEEN SAFETY

It's that time again when children enjoy dressing up and roaming the neighborhoods in search of some of their favorite candy. The Schoolcraft Police Dept will be out in full force to help ensure a safe Halloween. Here are some things we can do to help make this Halloween safer for everyone.

#### LIGHTING

Make sure the pathway to your home is well lit. If you are using candles to light the way, make sure they are a safe distance from the sidewalk or driveway. Some children wear items made of paper or carry paper bags. If you are going to use the "dark" affect, make sure there are no tripping hazards in the way.

#### CLOTHING

Use clothing or a costume that allows others to see your child from a safe distance. It's not uncommon for some children to ride their bikes, roller blades, or skateboards from house to house. Some children can travel at high speeds on these things and before you know it, they can be right on top of you.

#### CANDY

Talk with your children about eating candy before they get home. You should inspect the candy before they eat it. Make sure you inspect "all" the candy. Anything that looks like it was tampered with should be thrown out. It's best to error on the safe side.

#### GROUPS

If your child will be trick or treating without you make sure your child walks or rides around with other children and "never" alone.

## South County Emergency Siren Warning Policy



Listed below is a summary of the South County Emergency Siren Policy:

The South Kalamazoo County Fire Authority is responsible for activation of emergency sirens.

The siren may or may not be activated for severe weather storms. For instance, if there is a severe thunder storm to the north or south of Schoolcraft, and SKCFA does not believe that the storm will pass through the Village of Schoolcraft, the siren will not be activated.

The siren will **always** be activated for tornado warnings.

- The siren consists of three blasts – three minutes on – three minutes off. The blasts will continue until the tornado has passed.
- There will be **no** “all clear” warning.
- The warning system in the Fire Station may be activated in addition to the rotating siren.

On behalf of the Village of Schoolcraft, we ask that you review these simple steps with your family to ensure their safety.

## Tree Replacement

Within the next few weeks, you will see new trees planted to replace the trees that were removed from the Village right-of-way by AEP (American Electric Power).

If a tree is planted in front of your home or business in the Village right-of-way, you may wish to help it flourish by watering it daily, using fertilizer spikes or Miracle Gro in the fall and spring, and placing cypress mulch around the base of the tree.

## Leaf Pick Up

- Leaf pick up starts the last week of October and ends the week of Thanksgiving
- Only leaves will be picked.
- No sticks, root balls, trash or stones.
- Piles of leaves should be within 6 ft. of the street's edge and not in the street.

## Brush Pick Up

The last brush pick up will be Monday, October 25. Please adhere to the following guidelines:

- Brush may be put by the side of the road no earlier than the Wednesday before the scheduled pick up.
- Brush should be less than four inches (4”) in diameter.
- All cut ends of brush should be placed in the same direction, toward the road.
- Brush piles should be placed between the street and sidewalk when possible.
- Brush piles should be no larger than can be picked up by any one person.
- Brush piles should not be tied together with any material.
- Twigs must be bagged or boxed; we are unable to remove loose twigs.
- Unacceptable materials include leaves, trash, vines, nails, building materials, roots, plants, dirt, stumps, and limbs or brush generated through the removal of a tree, bush or hedge-row.
- Brush placed out in violation of these restrictions will not be picked up.

## Fire Hydrant Flushing

The fire hydrants will be flushed October 12, 2010. Please be sure to run your water before doing laundry to prevent yellowing of clothes.

## Recycling Program

At the direction of the Village Council, the Village Staff has been monitoring the Village's Recycling Program for the past several months. At the September 20, 2010, Village Council meeting, the Village Council made the decision to discontinue the program and to offer voluntary recycling to its many residents.

The decision of the Council was based on a number of factors as follows:

- Only 10% of Village resident were utilizing the program.
- Convenience or inconvenience of the program to households. Some people like it some people do not.
- Use of containers by residents and businesses located outside of the Village limits.
- Unfavorable work conditions for the recycling attendant.

The Village Council explored three options including continuation of the existing program, mandatory recycling and voluntary recycling.

After much discussion, the Village Council voted to discontinue the existing program, and to allow Village residents and businesses to contract for their own recycling through their garbage hauler on a voluntary basis.

The Village Council does recognize that discontinuance of the program will affect some Village residents. They know that many people do enjoy the current system. They also know that many people in the community also support and utilize curbside recycling services.

The Village program will continue through the month of November. Listed below are contact numbers for garbage companies that service the Village of Schoolcraft.

## Water Utility

Water bills are sent on or near March 1, June 1, September 1, and December 1. If you do not receive a bill, call the Village Office at 679-4304, and we will send you another one. Payment is **ALWAYS** due on the 15th, unless it falls on a weekend, then it will be due on the Monday after the 15th.

If you cannot make it to the Village Office during the business hours of 8:00-5:00 (we are open during the lunch hour), for your convenience, there is a secure drop box outside the main entrance to the Municipal Complex. Please do not put cash in the drop box.

## Water Report

The 2009/10 Fiscal Year Audit revealed a deficit in the Water Fund in the amount of \$113,205,000. As a result of this deficit, the Village of Schoolcraft is required to file a Deficit Elimination Plan with the State of Michigan with not more than a five year elimination plan.

The Village Council was made aware of this deficit by our Village Auditor, and asked the Water Committee come up with plan for the deficit elimination. The Water Committee looked into a number of options in order to come up with a reasonable plan as follows:

- The Five Year Plan will provide for a 1% increase in water rates each year for a period of five years.
- Water Department expenses will be held to a maximum increase of 1% each year.
- The value of capital assets will continue to decline over the next five years, and the addition of new capital assets will be limited.
- The long term debt for the Installment Loan for the Grand Street Water Relocation decreases, with final payment to be complete in Fiscal Year 2016.
- The Water Fund will be out of deficit in Fiscal Year 2015.

A family of four using approximately 70,000 gallons of water a year would pay an additional \$3.41 per year or \$.85 per quarter.

The Village Council approved an increase of 1% in water rates each year for the next five years beginning March 1, 2010. This decision was thoughtful and based on a number of options reviewed by the Water Committee.

The decision to raise water rates is never an easy one, but the Village Council felt that the 1% increase to water users would be the least harmful to our residents and one that would not adversely impact our General Fund and Equipment Fund.

## A Bit of History

### HOW THE VILLAGE BECAME KNOWN AS SCHOOLCRAFT

The Village of Schoolcraft was the first settlement established in Kalamazoo County. In fact, the Village was platted in 1831, six years before Michigan became a state.

Following the War of 1812, President James Madison realized the government would be unable to pay veterans which had fought in the war. However, there was an abundance of land available for homesteading.

President Madison directed Edwin Tiiffin, Surveyor – General to survey for homesteading. The expedition was not successful. He found the land in Michigan to be barren, sandy, swampy, and in other words, only capable of producing scrub. He further reported the

land to be worthless for farming purposes.

Lewis Cass, Governor of the Michigan Territory, was angered by the report. Many pioneers decided not to settle in Michigan because of the report.

As a result, the Governor commissioned his own survey and chose Henry Rowe Schoolcraft, renowned for his expertise in Mineralogy, to accompany him and his group.

The survey was a success and the report was published in eastern newspapers. As a result, the survey changed the public's perception of Michigan. This eventually attracted pioneers to Michigan.

Lucis Lyon, who has settled in the area, and who had also been a member of the Cass Expedition as well as a friend of Schoolcraft, decided to name the Village in his honor.

## Schoolcraft Schools are on the Move

**The year 2010-11 promises to be a year of accommodation and innovation . . .**

New to Schoolcraft this fall is the Early Elementary School initiated "Wrap Around" program. This program *accommodates* families by providing AM Kindergarteners or AM Young 5'ers with a quality ½ day of daycare in the afternoon. Early Elementary Principal, Cynthia Stull, under the advisement of Vicksburg's program coordinator, Carrie Harris, completed all steps required for licensing and safety regulation. Start-up costs were minimal, as materials were largely donated. Instructor, Amy Goldschmeding, receives the 18 students at 11:00 a.m., escorts them to the cafeteria for lunch then outside for recess. Julie Rutledge engages kids in story time, while Amy prepares the snacks. Students then rotate through learning stations targeting fine motor and early literacy skills. They also engage in computer usage and organized playtime. The fee is a mere \$10/day. At 18 students, the Wrap Around program is operating at capacity, with a waiting list !

Schoolcraft is also honored to *accommodate* 9 International Exchange students in our High School. Countries represented include: Denmark, Finland, Germany, Slovakia, S.Korea, Vietnam, China and Japan. An incredible win:win for our community.

This year our Food Service Director, Brenda Lynn, began serving breakfast in the Upper Elementary. It's an opportunity to *accommodate* the needs of many students. Breakfast is provided at 7:45 a.m. to any who wish to participate.

Also new this year is Schoolcraft's Discovery Class. Deb Lawrence, former 3<sup>rd</sup> grade teacher, with the technical assistance of James Weiss, technology director, captivates students in 21<sup>st</sup> Century *Innovation*. Students from Young 5's thru 5<sup>th</sup> grade interface with the latest technology for the purpose of skill acquisition in: computer usage, writing, art and technology. Schoolcraft is excited to offer this instruction.

The Varsity Football team also demonstrates *innovation*. Through the generous support of PNC

bank and much "behind the scenes" orchestration, Schoolcraft and all the KVA participated in The KVA Football Classic. Football players and Marching Bands alike experienced a moment of college life when they took the field at Waldo Stadium August 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>. What a thrill for students and community members to take part in such an event.

Lastly, all major in-house programs who participate in fundraising efforts (Athletic Boosters, Band Boosters, Choir, PTO, Camp Programs) are embarking on a new and *innovative* approach. Instead of door-to-door sales of products, they are hosting a **Fun "d" Walk/Run** on October 1, 2010. Students at all grade levels are asking for a 1 time pledge for walking or running laps around a course behind their school. The goal is to raise \$60,000 . . . supplanting the monies formerly earned from door-to-door sales.
